# Comprehensive School Safety Program (CSSP) and Child-Centered Disaster Risk Reduction (CCDRR)

for Teachers/Principals

(through VANDE Gujarat, SATCOM, BISAG) 4<sup>th</sup> Dec' 2018

#### Rationale

Schools are the most important institutions influencing the development of a country and are primarily entrusted with the responsibility of creating the citizens of tomorrow. No task is as important as creating a safe learning environment for our nation's children under the ambit of schools safety. Schools are often used as emergency shelters, as "safe havens" in times of disaster. As such, they should be resilient to disasters.

However as a matter of fact, in our country the school children and school buildings have been greatly affected by natural disasters and manmade events occurred in the past, including stampede in Dabwali (1995). Kumbhakonam fire tragedy (2004), Bhuj earthquake (2001), Jammu & Kashmir earthquake (2005), and Bihar Mid Day Meal Disaster (2013) etc. Further, in recent times the cases of security negligence and violence inside the school campus have also increased (Ex: Ryan School, New Delhi), which have also highlighted the importance of safety & security in schools.

Like many other States in India, Gujarat is prone to various hydro-meteorological, geological, industrial, human made and biological hazards. These different types of hazards include earthquakes, floods, droughts, cyclones, heatwave, chemicals, transportation / road accidents, epidemics, etc.

A safe and secure environment in and around the school is a prerequisite for effective teaching and learning. Amongst all the public facilities, children in schools are most vulnerable groups during any disaster/emergency situation. Hence, the importance of school safety through School Disaster Management Plan is gaining momentum since disasters and unprecedented events related to safety & security in schools are on the increase. School Safety has been defined as the creation of safe environments for children starting from their homes to their schools and back, in a comprehensive manner.

# Objectives

The *objective* of this program is to sensitize children and the school community on issues of disaster preparedness and safety measures and to motivate key stakeholders through direct participation in activities that would foster towards a disaster resilient community.

- · To have an overview on Disaster and Disaster Management
- To have comprehensive knowledge on various issues related to School Safety
- To understand School Disaster Management Planning (SDMP) process
- To develop basic understanding on First Aid and Fire Safety measures

## Disaster Risk Reduction needs to take place at the Local Level: School DM Plan

The degree of economic losses and amount of damage to buildings and infrastructure are determined by the different levels of exposure and vulnerability of the population, infrastructure, facilities, etc. of each locality.

The more local governments and local communities know about their risks by doing their own risk assessment and evaluation, the more they can learn about what they can do to protect themselves. We then have a better chance of reducing risks, loss and damage, and using the recovery period as an opportunity to create a stronger, more resilient community.

At the same time, many of the causes of disasters are not local. Flooding in one area can be affected by deforestation several kilometers away. One single local authority cannot resolve all risk factors. Therefore, it is also necessary to work with networks and associations on a larger scale.

The Initiative, called "School Safety Program", sought to promote a culture of disaster safety in schools by developing capacity among communities and school students and teachers, and helping them develop School Disaster Management Plans (SDMPs). Its activities included: raising awareness among school students and teachers: training student task forces on fire safety, emergency search and rescue, first aid, developing emergency evacuation plans, conducting earthquake evacuation mock drills, and preparing school disaster management plans.

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chool Disaster Management Plan is the plan, which helps school communities to be Prepared in case of a Disaster. It will help then to all promptly before, during and after the disaster situation. It will also help to form a different kind of team depending upon the kind of the role they have to play in disaster situation. It will also help to get a idea of the current as well as future scenario of the school related to the disaster situation and give indication about the issues in which teachers and students have to build their capacities in future. It will also help to form and active task forces, which will be very useful during the disaster situation and they will not act only in a school but also help the communities during the disaster situation and makes them responsible citizens in future.

#### Need of School Safety

The devastating Bhuj Earthquake of 2001 resulted in the death of 921 students and 31 teachers, collapse of 1,884 school building, loss of 5,950 classrooms, 11,761 school buildings suffered major to minor damages, additional 36,584 rooms unfit for holding instruction sessions.<sup>1</sup> After that, Gujarat State Disaster Management Authority (GSDMA) initiated pilot programs i.e. Gujarat School Safety Initiative (GSSI) - I & II<sup>2</sup> (2004-2006)<sup>3</sup> to promote a culture of disaster safety and risk reduction through structural and non-structural measures in schools. A School Safety Programme was implemented in the Kutch and Jamnagar districts of Gujarat (both falling under Earthquake Zone V). Since 2015, Gujarat School Safety Programme has been initiated with the key components of Hazard Risk Vulnerability Assessment in School, School Disaster Management Plan, Mock Drills in Schools, Structural and Non Structural Measures and IEC (Awareness Generation Material).

Considering the safety of school children and providing them safe environment as high priority area, sensitization on School Disaster Management Planning process by incorporating Disaster Risk Reduction will be essential.
